Amos Marshall per Trustees to Albert Hoyt

This Indenture made this 22nd day of May AD 1830. Witnesseth that Zudock King and Stephen M. Allen trustees of Chardon Township in the County of Geauga, State of Ohio, by and with the consent of George King, one of the justices of the peace of the County aforesaid, have put and placed, and by these presents do put and place Amos Marshall a poor boy of said township aged three years on the 14th day of July last, as a servant to Albert Hoyt of Munson in the County aforesaid with him to dwell and serve from the day of the date hereof, until he shall be of the full age of twenty one years, according to the statute in that case made and provided during all which term the said Amos shall faithfully and truly serve the said Albert in all lawful business according to his ability, and shall honestly, orderly and obediently in all things demean himself towards the said Albert and all his during the time aforesaid. – And the said Albert Hoyt for himself, his executors and administrators doth covenant and agree with the said Zaddock King and Stephen M. Allen Trustees as aforesaid, and to their successors in said office, that he provide and allow unto the said Amos Marshall, good and sufficient meat, drink, and apparel, washing, mending and all other things necessary and convenient for him in sickness and health and shall cause said Amos to be instructed to read and write, and so much arithmetic as to include the Rule of Three, and also shall and provide for him the said Amos so that he be not any way a charge to the township of Chardon or the citizens thereof, but of and from all such charges to save this township harmless and indemnified from the same. And at the expiration of said time shall provide and deliver to said Amos at least two good suits of common wearing apparel and a new bible agreeably to the Statute in such case made and provided.-----
